TILT – Tilburg Institute for Law, Technology, and Society brings to your attention the bi-annual multidisciplinary conference TILTing Perspectives on Technology Regulation

UNDER OBSERVATION Synergies, benefits and trade-offs of eHealth and surveillance

Tilburg, The Netherlands, 22-23 April 2015

Conference Theme: The notion that people are 'under observation' has multiple connotations. Bringing together two hitherto unrelated streams of scholarship interested in observation —eHealth and surveillance studies— this conference aims to inspire cross-fertilisation and bring new insights into the legal, ethical and social meanings of being 'under observation'.

Care for an aging population and for patients with chronic conditions is expensive. Staying healthy is actively encouraged by policy and practice. Use of eHealth solutions to this end is especially encouraged, as these applications are considered to be 'lean', cheap and capable of offering access to healthcare and lifestyle management anywhere, any time. Recent developments in mobile eHealth have led to wearable sensors that gather health data in real time and help take charge of our wellbeing, while Big Data Analytics and Predictive Analytics promise better understanding of disease, prevention and treatment.

But these technologies are not without their caveats. Most notably, they create new opportunities for surveilling and steering health-related behaviours. Recent scholarship on the relationship between the development of new technologies and trends in surveillance points to the multi-directional and mutual nature of the latter. In the field of health, this means that not only are patients watched by technologies, physicians, etc. but also that they are increasingly watching.

These new trends are in line with a general tendency to seek solutions to societal problems – crime, resource allocation, child welfare – in data aggregation, monitoring, profiling and behaviour tracking.

We therefore invite legal, ethical, and social scholars and practitioners, philosophers of technology and engineers, as well as persons working in the areas of health (including eHealth), assisted living, sensor technology, surveillance studies, data protection, data security and privacy to join us in exploring these developments during a two-day conference. We will explore and discuss the synergies, benefits and trade-offs of developments in eHealth and related changes in surveillance structures and practices.

Contributions and conference tracks

The topics of interest for the conference include but are not limited to:

• (mobile) health and lifestyle applications

- social acceptance of eHealth / eLifestyle
- social accountability and ethics
- ethical and policy issues of assisted living, eHealth / eLifestyle
- privacy and data protection issues relating to eHealth / eLifestyle, assisted living
- eHealth / eLifestyle, assisted living and
 - cloud computing, social networks, mobile devices
 - profiling, big data analytics, predictive analytics
 - sensor networks, biometrics, and cloud computing
- merging edges of bodily and information privacy
- surveillance and privacy and identity management
- surveillance and sensor networks, social media
- biosurveillance
- coveillance, sousveillance
- data protection reform: European and international developments

Compared to the previous editions of TILTing Perspectives, we have adopted a slightly different approach to the conference papers. There will be **two** parallel conference tracks:

1. Conference panels track

Submitted papers must be original, unpublished, and not submitted to another conference or journal for consideration for publication. Papers must be written in English; they should be at most 20 pages long in total, submitted as .doc or .docx files and format-free, using in-text citations. A template is

Papers will be peer reviewed by three to four reviewers. Accepted papers will be presented at the conference and – subject to editorial review – **published by Springer** as peer reviewed chapters of an edited conference volume in spring 2015.

At least one author of each accepted paper is required to register with the conference and present the paper.

2. The 'paper roast' track

Alongside the traditional conference panels with paper presentations, we planned something new: the 'paper roast' sessions. We invite longer –16000-20000 word (20-30 pages - paper submissions aiming to make a fundamental contribution to eHealth, surveillance or related scholarships. The 'paper roast' contributions will not be presented by the authors, but 'workshopped', i.e. discussed in detail in 1-hour-perpaper sessions, with a goal to contribute to the depth and solidity of the papers' arguments. Submitted papers must be original, unpublished, and not submitted to another conference or journal for consideration for publication. Papers must be written in English.

The target is to select 6-8 papers based on abstract submissions. Full papers are due one month before the conference. A commenter will be appointed for each paper. His/her task is to critically read and presents the paper at the workshop. Other workshop attendees are also expected to read the paper and engage in constructive criticism of the paper at the workshop. Based on the received comments, the author will have a few months - until 20 September 2015- to revise the piece and - subject to editorial review - have it ready for publication as a peer-reviewed article in a special issue of Law, Innovation, and Technology (Hart Publishing), scheduled for the first months of 2016.

At least one author of each accepted paper is required to register with the conference and participate in the 'paper roast' session.

7 December 2014 – publication-ready papers due

22-23 April 2015 - conference **Spring 2015** - papers published in an edited volume by Springer

The 'paper roast' track

11 January 2015 – extended abstracts due

end of January – communication to the authors

22 March 2015 – full papers due 21 – 24 April 2015 – the 'paper roast' session the day before or the day after the conference

20 September 2015 – revised papers due

October - November 2015 – notification of acceptance of final paper)

Beginning of 2016 – publication in a special issue of Law, Innovation, and Technology

The 'paper roast' abstracts and all papers must be submitted in electronic form through the web.
